First person point of view is limited. First person narrators cannot be everywhere at once and thus cannot get

all sides of the story. They are telling their story, not necessarily the story. First person point of view is biased. In first person novels, the reader almost always sympathizes with a first person narrator, even if the narrator is an anti-hero with major flaws.

The Second Person Point of View This point of view is the least common of all three persons, mostly because it's the hardest to pull off (without coming across as awkward or corny).
